My sharp eyed grandson noticed the following pebbles at a recent visit to the club – something I had not noticed in my 3 years here! Have you spotted it?




Does this date from the building of the clubhouse? I'm sure someone knows the answer?

A Celebration of Freda

22.7.1926--18.3.2017

Long standing members of Pinner Bowling club may remember Freda Russell who was a member of Harrow Bowls club. Freda has been a good friend of mine for over thirty years, since we met as florists working for Mansi in Pinner.

Freda grew up on a farm in Newport Pagnell. One day in conversation I asked Freda how long she had been driving, she told me that driving had been no problem for her as she had grown up driving tractors on the farm. She was delighted when a few years ago the Mayor of Harrow invited her to attend a ceremony of remembrance at Westminster Abbey. She had been part of the Land Army during the war and this ceremony was a celebration of thanks to all those who had been part of this.

Freda moved to Harrow when her husband Harold worked for the newspapers and was based near Wealdstone. He was the first to join Harrow Bowls club and when Freda saw how much time he spent there, decided she should join as well. I think that may sound familiar to a few people! Over the years Freda did her best to get Bob and I to join the bowls club, arranging for us to have a lesson at Harrow. Sadly, it never worked till much later.

Freda also belonged to the Mothers Union, The Allotment Society, St Albans Church and NAFAS (the flower arrangers society). Her wonderful garden was raided by on many occasions for the lovely foliages she grew, when I needed them for weddings and competitions. A great organizer, Freda taught City and Guild floristry at Weald College and when she had to retire, ensured that I replaced her. Together we have enjoyed many flower related events over the years, and she was so pleased that we had finally joined a bowls club!

About three years ago when she found it difficult to manage on her own, Freda moved to Woodbridge in Suffolk to be nearer her daughter, grandchildren, and great grandchildren who all cared for her so well.

A wonderful lady of whom I have many happy memories.
