Jack Webb 1931-2021

Jack Webb joined Harrow Bowls Club in 1985 and remained a member until his death in 2021. He was already an experienced bowler and quickly became a regular player in matches and was regularly selected to play in county and district competitions. When he joined in 1985, the new clubhouse was under construction and Jack, with his experience as an electrician working for A& E services, was soon heavily involved fitting out the club. The tables, that are still in use today, were "provided" by Jack from his place of work. He said they were being thrown out.



His bowling career was long and successful. He was made captain in 1993 and was a long term Vets Captain. Among his competition successes were Two Woods winner in 1992,94,and 96. He was Handicap Singles champion in 1992 and 93. Among his district successes was H&D singles champion in 1992 and a member of the Harrow H&D 4's winning teams in 1986 and 1990. Jack was also a member of the 2008 Harrow Middlesex double rink winning team.

Jack in his youth was heavily involved in sports and before National Service with the RAF almost had a successful career as a professional footballer playing for Brentford B team and for a short time Ted Drake of Chelsea was interested in his football abilities. Jack was also an accomplished badminton player

Jack will long be remembered as the "cheeky chappie" of the club and his happy extrovert attitude to life made him a pleasure to be with. With increasing age Jack still retained a youthful appearance and it belied his true age. However, father time catches up with all of us and Jack suffered health problems in his latter years. However it did not stop Jack from being an active member of Herga IBC and up to 2019 Jack was still a regular player.

Jack's partner for many years was Sylvia Colbourne, another long term Harrow bowler, they became a devoted couple and he was heavily supported by Sylvia during his difficult latter years. Jack leaves two children Ian and Julie.
